# Getting Ready For Lent and Easter

It seems we have just taken down the tree and other decorations for Christmas. There are some exceptions, however. A few houses still have their decorative lights burning at night. Instead of observing Advent and the 12 days of Christmas, they have extended that to 60 days! After all, they went to great expense on this project.

Now the focus, at least for pastors and worship leaders, is to make the needed preparations for Lent and Easter. This year there is only four and a half weeks between Epiphany and Ash Wednesday. This Newsletter, being prepared in January will, therefore, be a little sketchy and incomplete as to what is being planned. We are happy to announce that we are once again doing our planning cooperatively, though not with our partners in the past. We have been informed that Yaphank, Center Moriches, and Middle Island have designed a Tuesday Bible Study Program and will not be participating.

Ralph Wright, now serving as Interim at East Moriches and Remsenburg, contacted me and said he would still like to do something cooperatively. He brought this matter to the clergy group in his area and proposed that Old South Haven and the two congregations he now serves join with churches in the Westhampton area that have a history of doing things ecumenically. Plans are underway to do that.

An Ash Wednesday Service will be held at the Westhampton Beach Methodist Church at 7:00pm. The Rev. Mark Powell who is the Rector at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Westhampton Beach will be the preacher. He has been on Long Island only since this past June, having come from Wilmington, North Carolina.

That group is also planning to continue the old traditional three hour Good Friday Service on March 29<sup>th</sup> from 12noon to 3:00pm. Participating ministers will preach on the Seven Last Word's. It will be held at St. Mark's Episcopal Church.

Two other Good Friday opportunities are offered to us. St. James Episcopal Church, our closest neighbor, has invited us to join them in a Good Friday walk in our Brookhaven community. On Good Friday evening Bellport Methodist will join us at Old South Haven.

We are presently working on a Wednesday night Lenten Series. As of this writing Westhampton, East Moriches, Remsenburg, and Old South Haven will be hosting an evening. Old South Haven is scheduled for February 27.



These are the first two verses of the song "Hard Times Come Again No More" written and composed by Stephen Foster. Foster is considered by some as the first American songwriter of the modern era. He was something of a "pop star" in his time and like many of today's pop or rock stars he died young and broke. He died at 37 years of age with 38 cents of Civil War script and 3 pennies with a scrap of paper that simply said "Dear friends and gentle hearts" in his wallet.

As we go about our lives in our communities can we see the "frail forms fainting at the door" and are we ready and willing to "sup sorrow with the poor". Here at Old South Haven Presbyterian Church we support INN Friendship which provides a soup kitchen at St. Joseph the Worker Church in East Patchogue as part of our mission giving. Since 1992 volunteers from the various churches and organizations in the East Patchogue Bellport area have been serving free hot, nutritious meals to anyone who feels the need for a meal and/or companionship. According to INN Friendship statistics since 1995 they have provided over 56,000 meals with almost half the guests being children. In these hard times grants have been deleted and there is more need of assistance from others. So our support of INN Friendship is of consequence and meaning.



#### **Pastor Tom Receives Unitas Award**

Each October Union Theological Seminary, NYC holds its Union Days. During that period alumni/ae honor their own with the Unitas Distinguished Alumni/ae Awards. Honorees have distinguished themselves in the church, academy, and society across the country and around the world.

This past October Pastor Tom was one of four recipients of the award. His citation reads: "Union Theological Seminary in the City of New York proudly honors distinguished alumnus Thomas J. Philipp '62: Campus minister, veterans advocate, reproductive health services activist, LGBT activist; for his visionary advocacy for more than 50 years of God's inclusive, multi-faith, affirming, prochoice, compassionate commonwealth; and for transforming the lives of so many – quietly, unassuming, lovingly and efficiently – for the better"

Linda Majowka, Shirley MacKay and Nancy Best attended from our church. They were joined by Pastor Tom's two nieces and their husbands as well as several of his close friends.

The write up in the printed program stated: "On the vanguard of social justice for more than 50 years, Rev. Philipp is famous in Seminary annals for having stood up to President Van Dusen – while still a student, and at enormous personal risk – on behalf of full inclusion of LGBT persons within church and society. He is the recipient of numerous awards, among them the Higher Education Honor Roll Award of the Presbyterian Church (USA); and the Rev. Bea Blair Courageous Service Award from Family Advocates of New York, for his work to make abortion legal in New York prior to Roe vs. Wade. Recently he advocated on behalf of same-gender marriage legislation in New York State."

#### **We Host the Presbytery**

On Tuesday, April 16, Old South Haven will host the meeting of the Presbytery of Long Island. It is significant in that it will mark the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first time the Presbytery of Suffolk County (of which the Presbytery of Long Island is the successor) held one of its meetings at a "Parish of South Haven" meeting house: March 23, 1763.

As our present facility built in 1828 used the timber from the frame of the old meeting house, the members of Presbytery will be, at least partially, meeting within the walls in which they first met 250 years ago.

Our Church has begun making plans for that event. Darcy Stevens, assisted by Debbie Mayo, Diane Hall, and Linda Scott, will lead a committee which will supervise the overall operation. The meeting will begin with a Fellowship time and Registration in the Carriage House, AA which normally uses that facility at that time has made other arrangements for their meeting. The evening meal will be catered and take place at St. James Episcopal Church, our neighbor, which has a good size kitchen and fellowship hall. Arrangements are being made to allow parking on the street in what is normally a no parking zone during school hours.

It is anticipated that between 80 and 100 persons will be attending. There is a need for our OSHPC people to serve in various capacities: serve as hosts, assist in parking, handle registration and selling dinner tickets, arrange for child care, and respond to other requests.

As we welcome attendees at the beginning of the meeting we hope to introduce them 'briefly' to some of our history both in written material and maybe in a dramatic fashion. With this undertaking there are many ways each of us can assist to make it a great day.

## 2013 Morning Worship Assignments July - December


