

Pastor's Corner:

The China Buffet and the Book Cases

Though spring has not yet arrived, some of us have begun spring cleaning. One ritual I go through around this time of the year is to wash every piece of crystal and china in my buffet (I don't expect Ilene to do this). Through the year these items get coated with a layer of grime, easily removed with soap and water. Once the project is completed I enjoy standing back and marveling at the beauty of these pieces I treasure.

As some of you know there are two items I have accumulated over the years that I consider prize possessions. One is the many, many books that I own, some dating back to the early 1800's. The other prize possession is my collection of crystal and cut glass. One large vase belonged to my great grandmother, other pieces have been gifts or purchases through the years. Every time I perform this cleaning ritual I say to myself that I must use these items instead of just letting them sit there collecting dust (I get the message from my book cases as well: "Take me off the shelf and read me, that's the purpose I serve.") Unused treasures, whether on a bookshelf or in a china buffet.

New Pulpit Handrails Installed

New handrails were added to the stairs at either side of the pulpit this month. This is the first major alteration of the interior of the church since the removal of the front of the center



pews in 1999. Before the South Haven meeting house was moved to Brookhaven on December 28, 1960, not many used the steps up to the pulpit platform, as there were no doors at that end of the building. The "robing room" (now called the "Gallery") was added in 1961 and two doors were cut through into the main building.

Since its construction in 1828, there have been a number of major modifications of the interior of the meeting house. When initially erected, the interior followed the "reverse floor plan" that was popular for churches in rural areas of the northeast in the early nineteenth century. There was originally a high pulpit at the entrance-end of the meeting house, and worshipers entered through doors on either side of the pulpit. There was no balcony, nor was there a steeple and spire.

On August 19, 1861, Henry W. Titus, a wealthy director of the Long Island Rail Road who had an estate in Bellport, presented a "Plan for the Alteration of the Pews, Pulpit etc." The



Building Committee of the trustees made Mr. Titus, the "foreman for the Repairs of the House." The pulpit was moved to its current location, the pews were turned around, and a balcony was added.

The 1861 "new" pulpit was not the pulpit we have

APPORTIONMENT/PER CAPITA

In this Newsletter issue I am responding to requests to explain “apportionment” giving, also known as “per capita” – the amount contributed to higher judicatories (Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly) by every individual Presbyterian Church (USA) congregation. It can be thought of as our membership “dues” to belong to the interconnected Presbyterian Church denomination – a theologically based system of caring for one another from church to church and region to region.



Per Capita/Apportionment: for 2015 for our church is \$30.83 per member. Every one of our active church members – each spouse, partner, and every confirmed child in every family – is assessed \$30.83. Our Session then pays the aggregate amount of our congregants' per capita to the Presbytery. In January, the Treasurer made a payment of \$1,510.67 (49 members) to the Long Island Presbytery. The Presbytery uses the apportionment to cover its operating costs. Of the total apportionment payments received by Presbytery, 72% is spent here on Long Island to keep our local Presbytery functioning – primarily for Presbytery staff salaries, building heat and lighting, and administration. The Presbytery pays a portion of the apportionment to our regional ruling body, the Synod of the Northeast (4%), and our national ruling body the General Assembly (24%). While some members of the congregation make a separate contribution of their apportionment assessment (\$30.83) to the church over and above their regular giving, it is the aggregate “per capita” that is paid to Presbytery.

What we get back: an interconnected church organization – help when we need it. In return for the per capita amount we pay to the Presbytery of Long Island, the Presbytery takes care of us, together with all the other churches on Long Island, through shared resources: people, materials, knowledge, fellowship, and financial aid, when needed. The Presbytery communicates with all the churches, keeping everyone on the same page. Per capita “is the glue that holds Presbyterians together.” It is a payment that permits all Presbyterians to share costs that belong to the whole church. We function interdependently, and, thus, share our costs and our resources. This is part of being a member of the Presbyterian Church (USA).



today. The steps were winding and went up to a trapezoidal platform, as shown in the photo.

Rev. George Borthwick succeeded in having the interior of the church "restored" to a more colonial look in 1938. The winding steps were removed and replaced with straight steps, and a new pulpit with side panels, the one still in use today, was purchased from a church furniture company in Waukesha, Wisconsin, for \$750. The "Victorian brown" walls and the unpainted pews were painted white and light cream. The choir platform and its curtains were removed. "Hidden" lighting was placed in the ceiling, and the church then took on an appearance much like it has today. (The James H. Post memorial chandelier was added in 1961. The Rev. Charles Kellogg memorial cross was added in 1977.)

The OGHs Offering is one of three special offerings we support each year. The other two are the Peacemaking Offering and the Christmas Offering.


This offering underwrites three of our denomination's programs:
