## The Road of Lent

By the time you receive this issue of our quarterly "NEWS" we will be well on "The Road of Lent", culminating in Holy Week, and then the celebration of Easter. Roads mean much to me. That is inevitable given the amount of driving I do around Long Island. I delight when my destination can be reached by taking a parkway or expressway. They usually mean I will reach my destination in good time and the traveling will be fairly easy (unless, of course, there is a traffic build up). Other times my destination can be reached only by navigating the back roads and side streets, often encountering curves, dead ends, and unmarked avenues, demanding my patience, my fortitude, my determination, and sometimes in inquiring of a native or the consulting of a map. (No, I don't have a GPS which can't always be trusted anyway!)

Would that the Road of Lent were a six or eight lane expressway that brought us rapidly through the Valley we call Lent and Good Friday, and land us without any inconvenience at Easter's door step. Would that we could on Transfiguration Sunday with its mountain top experience, not only see the Promised Land, God's Kingdom, but see also the quickest way to get there.

Lent brings us back to reality. My first three sermons of Lent have sought to declare that reality: "Tempting Opportunity", "To Jerusalem" and "Life is not God". Lent reminds us of the times in our Christian journey when it is marked by curves and dips, even dead ends. Lent reminds us when the pathway is not clearly marked or illuminated, and we must inquire of others, consult the scriptural maps, and above all pray and trust and lean on the everlasting arms of God. As we read of our Lord's pilgrimage we marvel that he experienced the same. Often his prayers carried the desperate plea of asking God to both show the way and express God's will.

Easter is not Easter without the pilgrimage of Lent.

- A Deacons' meeting was held on April 10, 2015 discussing assignments for deacons and upcoming events.
- The Deacons' follow-up meeting with the Session was held on June 15, 2015 where we discussed roles of the deacons, how we can reach out to the church community and community at-large.

Throughout the year, the committee oversaw the general maintenance of church property. On June 6, 2015 and August 29, 2015, several members and friends gathered for two yard clean-ups.

Due to Claudia Taylor's dedication and hard work, the Memorial Garden's appearance has been greatly improved.

During the year, several improvements were made. On February 6, 2015, HB Millwork installed the pulpit handrails and on June 30, 2015, the manse driveway was paved.

A major focus of the committee's work was discussion and planning for the parking lot expansion and paving and installation of a lamppost at the driveway's entrance. As a result of that focus, the committee recommended to the session that a capital campaign be established and a capital campaign committee be formed for the purpose of fund raising for the parking lot/lamppost project. The session agreed to the committee's recommendation. Much of the committee's original planning has come to fruition. It was a busy year.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF 2015 CAPITAL CAMPAIGN FUND COMMITTEE FOR IMPROVEMENT OF CHURCH PARKING LOT AND DRIVEWAY

In the summer of 2015 a Capital Campaign Fund Committee was formed consisting of Pastor Tom Philipp, Nancy Best, John Deitz, Elizabeth Fuka and Irene Stahman.



The committee has met several times, beginning in the summer, and a letter was sent to members and friends of Old South Haven Church explaining the project and the need for funds amounting to \$45,400. The plans

showed the repaving and enlarging of the parking lot, the enlargement of the driveway and a lamppost to be installed at the entrance to the driveway. The lamppost, through a contribution from a member, has been installed and the parking lot has been completed.

From up-front contributions and pledges which can be spread over 3 years, a \$1,000 grant from the Post-Morrow Foundation, and proceeds from the Christmas Boutique sponsored by the Deacons along with Committee and congregation members, we have reached 86% of our goal, or \$39,111.79. Thank you letters have been sent to all contributors, and we are very grateful for the response.



## 2015 Financial Report Summary

### 2015 Income\*, excluding 2015 Capital Fund Income, Compared to 2014 Income

Excluding the 2015 Capital Fund Contributions, the deposits for 2015 totaled about \$74,500.

The Capital Campaign Fund 2015 income totaled about \$23,000.

The total of deposits in 2014 totaled about \$87,000.

The deposits in 2015 (excluding Capital Fund contributions) were approximately \$12,600 less than in 2014. A significant portion of this decrease in income was due to the deaths of primary donors.

### 2015 Expenses\*, excluding 2015 Capital Fund Expenses, Compared to 2014 Expenses

Excluding 2015 Capital Fund expenses, the total of disbursements in 2015 totaled about \$75,700.

The 2015 Capital Fund expenses totaled about \$27,700.

Without the 2015 Capital Campaign Fund expenses, the 2015 disbursements, were about \$1,700 less than the total disbursements in 2014.

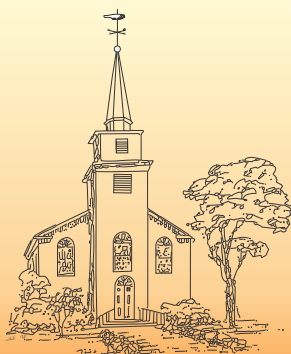
